

JESUS PROVIDES THE WISDOM needed for being ready to meet him when he comes again. In today's Gospel reading, Jesus cautions his listeners to *stay awake*, "for you know neither the day nor the hour". He warns them not to be like the foolish bridesmaids who were unprepared and were shocked to discover that, at the decisive hour, because they were unprepared, they were excluded. Until then, there seemed to be no difference between the wise and foolish bridesmaids. But the midnight call to action finds the wise prepared and welcomed, and the foolish unprepared and left out.

The month of November, begins with All Saints' Day, which is immediately followed by All Souls' Day, when we pray in a special way for our departed loved ones. St. Paul tells the Thessalonians that when the Lord Jesus returns in glory, those who have already died *will rise first. Then we who are alive ... will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air.*

How, then, can we best prepare to meet the Lord? Our first reading may have the key. Wisdom can be *found by those who seek her*. And the wisdom we seek – to be prepared to meet the Lord – is found in what Jesus teaches his disciples. His message is about how we are to live in the kingdom of God here on earth, so as to live with God after our death. His lessons are about forgiving others generously, being grateful for the generosity of others, following through on our word, and not expecting reward for doing the right thing. Most important, he teaches that loving God with all our mind, heart and soul, and humbly loving our neighbor as ourselves, are the greatest commandments.

The lessons Jesus taught his listeners as he prepared for his death provide us all the wisdom we need for being prepared for our own deaths. Let us stay awake in seeking to live in the wisdom Jesus shares and find ways to grow in our love for God and neighbors.

Hasta entonces, no se veía diferencia entre las prevenidas, y las que no se prepararon. Pero la media noche llamo a la acción del encuentro, las sabias que se prepararon, le dieron la bienvenida, y a las descuidadas las dejaron fuera.

El mes de Noviembre, comienza con el Día de Todos los Santos, el cual es seguido inmediatamente del Día de Todos los Fieles Difuntos, cuando oramos por todos nuestros seres queridos que ya partieron. San Pablo, dice a los Tesalonicenses que, cuando el Señor regrese en gloria, aquellos que murieron, *resucitaran primero*. Entonces, nosotros los que estemos vivos...seremos arrebatados, juntamente con ellos entre nubes por el aire, para ir al encuentro del Señor.

Entonces, ¿Cómo podemos estar preparados de la mejor manera para encontrarnos con el Señor? Nuestra primera lectura puede tener la clave. La Sabiduría puede ser encontrada por los que la buscan. Y la sabiduría que buscamos – para estar preparados al encuentro del Señor – es encontrada en lo que Jesús enseña a sus discípulos. Su mensaje es acerca de cómo vivir el reino de Dios aquí en la tierra. Sus lecciones son acerca de perdonar a otros generosamente, siendo agradecidos por la generosidad de otros, siguiendo mediante nuestra palabra, y no esperando premio por hacer lo correcto. Lo más importante que el enseña es, que amemos a Dios con toda nuestra mente, todo nuestro Corazón y toda nuestra alma, y humildemente amar a nuestro prójimo como a nosotros mismos, esos son los más grandes mandamientos.

Las lecciones que Jesús enseñó a sus oyentes, mientras él se preparaba para su muerte, nos daba a todos la sabiduría que necesitamos para estar preparados para nuestra propia muerte. Estemos despiertos, y busquemos vivir en la sabiduría que Jesús nos comparte, y buscar crecer en nuestro amor por Dios y nuestro prójimo.

FAITH SERIES: CATECHISM THROUGH THE YEAR

WHAT IS ORIGINAL SIN?

Much of the language in Genesis' opening chapters is figurative. Nonetheless, the Catholic Church affirms that we find there a reference to a real event in time that took place at the very beginning of the human race — a tragedy unequalled in history, known as the Fall (Gn 3:1-24). We know few details, but the basic truths surrounding that fateful development are clear from the teaching of Scripture, both here and elsewhere, along with Tradition:

- ♦ God created our first human parents in a state of holiness, an original justice (righteousness) that is without sin, and thus without shame (Gn 2:25). Each enjoyed a right and harmonious relationship with God, with his/herself, each other, and the world around them (Gn 1:26-31, 2:8-9, 15, 21-25).
- ♦ Through their own free choice, however, they disobeyed God, breaking fellowship with him (Gn 2:15-17, 3:1-13, Sir 15:14).
- ♦ Their disobedience — a turning away from the Source of all life and order — necessarily brought death and disorder into the world, but, above all, within themselves. So they "fell" from their previous condition to a state of sinfulness, misery, and ignorance (Gn 3:14-24). Their human nature was deeply wounded, though not totally corrupted.
- ♦ Our first parents, having lost their original wholeness, could not pass on to their descendants what they themselves no longer possessed. This deprivation is consequently inherited by all human beings, and is called "original sin" (Rom 5:12-19).
- ♦ Unlike personal sin, resulting from the wrong choices of each individual, original sin does not result from our own doing. It is contracted, not committed—we are conceived with it (Ps 51:7).
- ♦ The sacrament of Baptism cleanses us from original sin and restores us to original righteousness and fellowship with God (Acts 2:38, 22:16). But, after Baptism, we are still left with a certain moral and spiritual weakness (concupiscence), so that even though our wills are free, we are inclined to sin. This inclination we must continually overcome by God's grace (Rom 6:19, 7:15-24).
- ♦ The only two human beings (after our first parents) to be conceived without original sin are our Lord Jesus Christ (2 Cor 5:21), and his blessed mother, whose Immaculate Conception was possible through the merits of her sinless Son (Lk 1:28).
